'Artists respond to the world around. Imagination is crucial, as are all the ways in which we see what we see – we watch, observe, look, study, scrutinise, witness, and so much more. And artists transform: the overlooked is revealed, the forgotten is remembered, the abandoned is found, the unfamiliar is confronted, the familiar becomes unfamiliar, the ugly becomes beautiful, the beautiful becomes questioned...

It is thrilling to have participated in the selection process for this exhibition of young artists' work. It has been an enormous privilege to see the abundance of talent of the young artists. With so many extremely strong submissions, myself and the other judges had a difficult task in making a selection.

It was a thoroughly humbling experience to realise that making judgements of what might be good art became less important than being surprised by the ambition of particular works, and by the struggle to make something find itself, by extraordinary composition, by something startlingly different and by brave decisions with colour and medium.

An exhibition such as this is important in recognising how young artists interpret the world around them. They give us insights into their world and their experiences of that world, and gives precedence to their concerns of what it means to be a young person today, and their powerful perceptions of what the future holds for them. Nothing could be more important than that considering what they have been through over the last eighteen months.

Importantly, this exhibition also acknowledges and commends the incredible hard work of teachers and educators who, often against considerable odds, are finding ways to support their students to explore and nourish their creativity.

My heartfelt congratulations and thanks to all the young artists who submitted works, the educators who have supported them to do so, and the exhibiting artists.'



Oil pastels


My glorious life in Spring, eating Easter eggs under the lovely sunshine.

Acrylic and watercolour paints on paper



Andy, age 7 Camp


Pen, felts on paper mounted on board

70 Ginevra, age 8 The Blue Vase


Acrylic paint on canvas

86 Emilia, age 9 Girl on the Mountain


Watercolours, pencils & oil pastels on canvas





Acrylic paint on paper



In the painting she is sitting cross-legged on the floor of the bathroom, with the toilet close to her right knee and the sink just above her head, symbolising the instructions all around us to be regularly washing our hands. She is in her pyjamas, in the afternoon, and doesn't need or bother to get dressed, as days blend into one long period of time.



175 Grace, age 15 Bedroom or Cell?

Oil & acrylic paint on canvas

When I was 11 years old my dad was sent to prison, and I became the 'prisoner by default'. When somebody goes to prison, no one accounts for the people left behind, the ones 'in front of the bars', and in fact, these people are affected just as much as the person inside. I felt the need to use my creativity to express this, considering art is what got me through the worst of it.



176 Jacob, age 15 July 1930 Standard 3

Acrylic paint on canvas

This is a painting based on the school photograph of my grandfather's class in 1930. I have been working on this painting over the last year in the lead up to my grandfather's birthday in May 2021, when he would have turned 100. He is pictured 5th from the left, second row from the top in the navy blue suit. I was painting from a black and white image but I wanted to bring these boys to life and give them a modern feel with their brightly coloured clothes.



177 Nathan, age 15 Industrial Decay

Coloured pencils & watercolour pencils

I photographed a wide variety of warehouses in the Dockland areas of Liverpool and I always shot my photographs by looking up towards the sky, giving a sense of height and grandeur. This detailed colour pencil drawing is from one of my photographs.



178 Tavishi, age 15 *Everyday Hero*

Pencil on paper

A portrait of the artist's father in the urban environment.

An apocalyptic diorama created amid the unceasing quarantine. This model depicts a dramatized version of the future many of us felt near.



180 Ruby, age 16 *Merry Christmask*

Oil on canvas

This was inspired by an old family Christmas photo and the difference between those times and now. I aimed to portray through this that even though Christmas looked different this year, the love shared between the family remained the same. It was made by using a photo from before I was born and digitally adding masks to the family in compliance with COVID-19 guidelines.



181 Harry, age 16 Body Image

Acrylic paint

I chose to do a painting of my brother standing in his room. I wanted to use a very subtle technique to capture the main shapes and textures of the composition. I chose to work in acrylic paint so it would dry quickly and I could lay new areas of paint on top that allowed the previous layers to also be seen.



182 Saskia, age 16 *Madame Baker*

Acrylic paint & textiles

This piece was from my portraiture project, in which I became increasingly interested in the materials worn by the sitters. I had been looking at the work of Gustav Klimt and his use of flat pattern, for my work I decided to incorporate actual varied pieces of cloth to capture both the sitter and the background.



183 Hattie, age 16 Remodelled

Mixed media

Cecil Beaton was in the bookshop. Hidden amongst the shelves of art books was this book of photographs Beaton took in India, 1945. I was inspired to remodel it into something else. I wanted this piece to look like a fractured mirror with different expressions in each segment. Each slice has a different expression and focuses on a different feature of the face from different angles and depths therefore it portrays a lot of emotions.



186 Jess, age 16 Apple and Boy in Suit

Photograph featuring sculpture made from chicken wire, newspaper, cardboard, acrylic, varnish

In this piece, I photographed a sculpture of an apple that I made using a base of cardboard and chicken wire which I then layered it with newspaper and then painted it red with a varnish finish. I chose to photograph my apple with my brother in the background in a large, open space to create an out of place, dreamlike quality.



187 Leo, age 16 Decay

Black clay

This piece is inspired by the destruction of our forests due to human impact. The charred or broken remains of trees that are ripped down destroying our earth. Animal habitats lost just for money. It's not too late to make a change and I want to be part of that change.





Acrylic paint on card

This is a self-portrait I completed during November when we got back to school after COVID-19. It took me about 10 hours to complete. It is based on a selfie. I'd already painted a portrait of my brother during lockdown and wanted to do something a little bit different for my exam piece. Normally my hair is braided (this takes more than hours) but in the photo, my hair is loose, more of an afro style.



189 Amelie-Mo, age 16 Tudor Grove

Acrylic paint on paper

I created this painting after a trip to Hackney to explore community and gentrification.



191 Amaan, age 16 The Future

During the Black Lives Matter protests that happened following the death of George Floyd, along with 4,000 other people, I attended a protest in Birmingham city centre. While I was there I knew I had to document this experience. I hope this image can provide hope, solace and perhaps inspiration to the people who need it, no matter the cause.



190 Ava, age 16 *Orla*

Acrylic paint

I was inspired by my favourite artist Lynette Yiadom-Boakye's portraits which I saw recently at the Tate Britain. I was interested in the way in which she paints skin tone contrasting with vibrant backgrounds. I have implemented this style into my painting.



192 Heather, age 16 *Lookalik*e



Ceramic



Acrylic paint on MDF framed

How are you feeling, truthfully? Humans, have we become intimate objects, or were we to begin with?

Paint, bubble wrap, masking tape, glue, papier-mâché

I used octopuses as inspiration for when I was making this headpiece and in particular their suckers and tentacles. I like the beautiful arcs of movement they can make in the water and I've tried to emulate that.



204 Tram, age 17 Phong Nha Cave

Acrylic painting with a frame

This limestone karst cave is inspired by a memory of Vietnam and is one of the Vietnamese's pride because it's the first wonder of Vietnam. It's a reflection of Vietnam from my current location, Cyprus, so the technique I used was inspired by a Cypriot artist called Soula Lipsou.



205 Eleanor, age 17 Me Running from Chess

Ink (dip pen and wash)

This piece is an ink illustration depicting myself and a smaller version of myself running from a row of characters inspired by chess pieces. The Queen, in the centre of the piece, looms overhead while the pawns crowd her feet and the other pieces surround her. The drawing was inspired by feelings of being overwhelmed and feeling not in control of your mind.



206 Maliha, age 17 *Grandma's Hair*

I was at my Grandma's house one weekend along with my younger brother, who was helping my grandma get ready for the day by brushing her hair. I decided to capture the moment with a quick sketch of the scene before me.



207 Ismay, age 17 The Commute

Oil paint

The central character of the piece is staring directly at the viewer, whose expression could be of acceptance and tolerance of the close proximity of the other characters that represent a variety of subcultures. Between the prison-like bars, regardless of how they feel about each other, they are trapped together as they consciously maintain and protect their personal space.



208 Stan, age 17 Conveyor Belt

Cardboard & glue

Inspired by the Russian Constructivist movement, the sculpture captures the dynamic movement of industrialism. The piece incorporates simplified geometric units, with links to Malevich, representing a variety of commercial objects, such as tools, musical instruments and furniture, spinning around a conveyor belt.



209 Lucy, age 17 Outside Looking In

Acrylic paint on paper

The viewer is looking through the window at a woman sat watching tv, the blue light illuminating the practically empty room. Large bay windows take up most of the composition, emphasising the physical and emotional separation between us and the woman. The subject seems passive and distant, the screen in front of her the only thing connecting her to the outside world, a feeling felt by many throughout the pandemic.



210 Ayisha, age 17 Symbolic Still Life

Oil pastels on sketchbook paper

The symbolisation of femininity through the arrangement of natural objects and ceramics, inspired by Frances Palmer's work. The use of the blue scarf base adds a soft, feminine texture and depth to the ensembles as it symbolises loyalty. Each ceramic, purposefully arranged to have levels, has different patterns and colours, this makes the ensemble more engaging, complex and detailed. Their positioning in relation to the flowers also creates a sense of unity.

Human Routine (Banana)

Watercolour on cartridge paper

This piece is one of my painting outcomes from the subtheme 'Food', taken from the main theme 'Events'. In this particular piece, I used watercolour for the first time to expand my experience of different media and experiment with different forms of paint. I particularly enjoy the angle and shadows in this piece and feel like this is a successful first attempt at watercolour.



212 Ursula, age 17 Feeling Blue - A Short Film

Clay stop go animation

Feeling Blue' is a short film diving into the impact of technology on mental health. The movie explores the mental twists and turns that the wider population took through quarantine. The video is made from clay and gradually takes more abstract tones to convey the messages of distress and isolation.



213 Anika, age 17 Colour, Colour, Colour

Oil pastel & ink

Using Makaton sign, Anika says 'I did a picture to music'.



215 Milana, age 17 The Call of Home

Oil paints on reclaimed canvas with collaged elements

Inspired by my childhood memories of our pastoral life in Russia, in the early 21st Century, I decided to paint a scene, inspired by the work of my idol Marc Chagall. This image comes from one of my fondest memories looking after our family chickens.

I feel as though this perfectly represents the ideas of old and new trends in consumer needs for buildings. The high contrasted black and white further reinforces this idea of a juxtaposition.

This painting is an experiment with a more fluid and abstract style. It represents a lack of emotion and feelings of loneliness, hence the title *Voided*.

222 Charlotte, age 17 Radioactive Door

Acrylic paint on canvas

This is a piece created within my Radioactive Decay project, based upon photography I captured at the abandoned RAF base in Colleyweston. This piece represents radioactive decay, the effect it can have on our world and the destruction of our environment.



224 Nathanael, age 17 *Re-Form*

Wood & Slate

Segmented Sycamore and Slate sculpture. I love the process of cutting the wood into small segments and re-joining them to create something new. The internal beauty of the wood is revealed when it is sanded and finished. This is the first time I have used slate in my work.





225 Anie, age 17 Daily Walk

Ceramic

This is a clay relief piece describing an area of the North Down Coast in Northern Ireland. I frequently walked here during lockdown and was inspired by the patterns, repetition and rhythms of the sea itself as well as my daily walking routine.



226 Salamat, age 18 Black Star

Oil paint on canvas

This painting was inspired by the Black Lives Matter movement, which resurged after the death of George Floyd in May 2020. The raised fist became a symbol of the movement. The background is inspired by African fabric chosen because of how bold, beautiful and intricate it is which is a reflection of the African heritage.



227 Arthur, age 18 Cocoon Coat

Denim, cotton

The Cocoon Coat is meant to be worn by someone who shuts themselves inside, either because they are upset or because they don't feel comfortable showing themselves on the outside. This is why it is essentially a sleeping bag with no sleeves. For me, it is a period of transition that one goes through like a caterpillar in a cocoon, before breaking out and growing wings to be a colourful butterfly.



228 Millie, age 18 BEA

Linoprint

I have always loved the art of lino print. It works very naturally for me and I enjoy every step of the process. My coursework has stayed close to the female figure, primarily focusing on the body and not so much the face due to how different artists portray the female body. I love using small details so I try to make linos very large so I am able to incorporate such tiny details such as the zipper of her top.



229 Yunwei, age 18 *Quarantine*

Oil on canvas

This is an oil painting from a photograph that I took in my grandma's inpatient ward, when I visited her in hospital in May 2020. The withered flowers are a representation of my feelings during the pandemic, the explosion of COVID-19 and my experience of quarantine in a hotel room for 14 days alone. As well as representing my mental health during this period of isolation, it also signifies my grandma's deteriorating physical condition.



230 Evie, age 18 Running out of Lockdown

During the first COVID-19 lockdown I made a cardboard house costume to represent the activities that a single household was allowed to do. One of the activities that I focused on was running.



231 Edesi, age 18 *Outside*

Acrylic, watercolour & oil pastels on paper

Due to lockdown and my inability to freely leave my house, I began to see outside as this rare thing. So close yet unreachable. I often gaze at this view through the glass door as I do my school work in fascination. I believe my use of various mediums will emphasise the different emotions that I usually feel when looking through the glass. Acrylic paint, clay & organic matter on MDF



Macarons were likened to human desires because macarons look beautiful and taste sweet. There are people on the tower trying to climb higher and reach the top. The top of the tower is collapsing, illustrating people's greed.



234 Anna, age 18 Surface

Plaster

During lockdown we were all confined to our immediate environment - our homes. In this time, the everyday surfaces we took for granted became important. I noticed I could cast the surface of my entire house in plaster. However, I settled in producing a multitude of different surfaces in the form of tiles.



235 Olesya, age 18 The Fight at Moscow Pride

I'm from Moscow and struggle with my country's record on LGBTQ+ rights. I made this digital painting from a picture at the most recent Gay Pride march, where I was horrified to see such brutality from members of the public and the police. The image is made up of my face composited onto the faces of the victims.



236 Elliot, age 18 Present for my Mum

Stone carving

This was created as part of an A-Level stone carving project. It's made using an aerated breeze block and a wood chisel. It now sits in my garden as my mum really wanted it.
